




EGPAF AND ITS NATIONAL AFFILIATES

BACKGROUND: EGPAF'S AFFILIATION MODEL

The Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation (EGPAF) is committed to advancing country ownership of the HIV response and works to strengthen the capacity of ministries of health, local health authorities, civil society organizations and private sector providers. In 2011, with the support of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), EGPAF supported the creation of three independent, voluntarily affiliated national organizations in Côte d'Ivoire (Fondation Ariel Glaser pour la Lutte contre le Sida Pédiatrique), Mozambique (Fundação Ariel Glaser Contra o SIDA Pediátrico), and Tanzania (Ariel Glaser Pediatric AIDS Healthcare Initiative [AGPAHI]).

EGPAF has provided comprehensive capacity building for its affiliates in a variety of organizational areas, including governance, program management, financial management, legal and donor compliance, advocacy for the elimination of pediatric HIV, and resource mobilization. As part of our commitment to high-quality and effective programs, EGPAF periodically conducts a rigorous accreditation of affiliates, which informs a responsive capacity building plan. While affiliated with EGPAF, the affiliates are governed and operated by autonomous, national boards of directors and staff who independently manage institutional finances, personnel, programs, and all related decisions.



ARIEL GLASER PEDIATRIC AIDS HEALTHCARE INITIATIVE (AGPAHI)



With funding from CDC, USAID and UNFPA, AGPAHI supports HIV prevention, care and treatment, reproductive health, and TB service delivery in Shinyanga, Geita and Simiyu regions of Tanzania. AGPAHI works with and through the Tanzanian Ministry of Health and Social Welfare to strengthen the programmatic, operational, and administrative capacity of regional, district and site health workers and managers. Through technical assistance and sub-grants, AGPAHI strengthens HIV, TB and RCH clinical services and linkages, laboratories, supply chain management, data collection and use, financial management, and human resources at lower levels. Between October 2011 and June 2014, AGPAHI tested 245,355 pregnant women, 95 percent of whom received their results. 4 percent of pregnant women tested positive, and of those women, 80 percent received ARVs, along with 59 percent of infants. As of June 2014, AGPAHI currently supports 43,943 patients in HIV care and 36,446 patients on treatment, including 838 children under five, at 314 sites. AGPAHI's 2014 annual funding totaled approximately \$5.9 million.

FUNDAÇÃO ARIEL GLASER CONTRA O SIDA PEDIÁTRICO (FUNDAÇÃO ARIEL)



Fundação Ariel supports the Mozambique Ministry of Health at the national, provincial, district and site levels to strengthen HIV prevention, care and treatment, TB, MCH and nutrition services. With funding from CDC, Fundação Ariel supports 190 sites in Maputo and Cabo Delgado provinces. Fundação Ariel provides sub-grants and technical assistance to health authorities and community-based organizations to strengthen national capacity to effectively scale up and sustain HIV, TB, and MCH services. In 2013 and 2014, Fundação Ariel is particularly focused on supporting the scale up of integrated "one-stop shop" models for TB/HIV, MCH/HIV, and "the family model of care," which works to provide prevention, care and treatment services to families holistically. Between October 2011 and June 2014, Fundação Ariel tested 340,782 pregnant women, 100 percent of whom received their results. 8 percent of pregnant women tested positive, and of those women, 89 percent received ARVs, along with 55 percent of infants. Through June 2014, Fundação Ariel supports 140,543 patients in care and 99,544 patients on treatment, including 2,572 children under 24 months. Fundação Ariel's 2014 annual funding totaled approximately \$12.8 million.

FONDATION ARIEL GLASER POUR LA LUTTE CONTRE LE SIDA PÉDIATRIQUE (FONDATION ARIEL)



Fondation Ariel provides comprehensive HIV technical assistance to national Ivoirian health authorities at the regional, district and site level in Abidjan 1, Grands Ponts, Abidjan 2, and Gboklè-Nawa-San Pédro regions. Additionally, Fondation Ariel strengthens the capacity of Ivoirian civil society organizations through comprehensive organizational capacity building and sub-grants. Fondation Ariel's technical assistance includes prevention, care and treatment clinical areas, TB/HIV, data quality and systems, laboratory, supply chain, and infrastructure improvements at facilities. Between October 2011 and June 2014, Fondation Ariel tested 437,574 pregnant women, 99 percent of whom received their results. 3 percent of pregnant women tested positive, and of those women, 100 percent received ARVs, along with 82 percent of infants. As of June 2014, Fondation Ariel supports 33,220 patients in care and 30,171 patients on treatment, including 305 children under five, at 160 sites. Fondation Ariel's 2014 annual funding totaled approximately \$12 million.
